




EXTRACTS of MURICULATION of the Arms of WILLIAM JOHN MacINNIS.

WILLIAM JOHN MacINNIS, Attorney and Counsellor at Law, sometime Mayor of Gloucester in the State of Massachusetts, United States of America, residing at 8 Fowey Street there having by Petition unto the Lord Lyon King of Arms of date 7 May 1900 SHewn; THAT he, the Petitioner (who married 1918 Florence Lyman daughter of Walter Clarence Beris and has with other issue a son and heir William John MacInnis, younger of that name) is the eldest son of Murdoch MacInnis, Master Mariner, born Malagawatch, Port Hastings, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, Canada, September 1842 and died at sea whilst in command of the schooner "Trion" 1 June 1895, who resided at Gloucester, Massachusetts, and his wife Mary Louise daughter of Norman MacDonald, born in North List which he left to settle at Enon, Cape Breton, and his wife Margaret MacVicar; THAT the Petitioner's said father was the seventh son of Murdoch MacInnis, born 1600 in the Isle of Skye which he left, sailing from Iban aboard the "Fector" in 1620 to settle at Malagawatch aforesaid, and his wife Catherine MacLeod; THAT Arms are recorded as for the said last mentioned Murdoch MacInnis in the Public Register of All Arms and Bearings in Scotland (Vol. 44, page 79) of date 24 July 1900; AND the Petitioner having prayed that the said arms might be recorded of new in his own name with his due and congruent difference, The Lord Lyon King of Arms by Interlocutor of date 24 July 1900 Granted Warrant to the Lyon Clerk to make out in the Public Register of All Arms and Bearings in Scotland in name of the Petitioner the following Ensigns Armorial, videlicet: — Quarterly; 1st, Azure, a castle of two towers Or, port and windows Gules; — 2nd and 3rd, Or, upon a sea in base underlyng a bend Argent, a rampant Vert flagged and five visible dots in action Gules; — 4th, Argent of eight Sable and Or; — the all, dividing the quarters, a cross Vert charged with a mill-wheel between four pheons Argent, — impaled by two cross-crosslets in the flanks, and as many cross-crosslets — Gules in chief and in base of the said cross all of the last; all within a bordure Sable for difference. Above the Shield is placed an Helm besetting his degree, with a Mantling Gules doubled Or, and on a Wreath of the Liveries is set for Crest a sinister arm from the shoulder bendways, armed in a close sleeve of the proper colour of the Helm, holding a broadsword hilted Vert, pommel and hilt Gules, the blade Yellow with three buttons Or, — grasping a bow Vert, stringed Gules, and in an Escut over the same this motto GEIFG·DAE·OGUS·ON·RIGH·

Muriculated the 25th day of January 1901.
