
historic Old Laurel Hill Presbyterian Church on Sunday in Laurinburg. With so many MacInnes' in the area – hoping for and expecting a good turnout.



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#### **Front Cover:**

The front cover shows several of the Scottish Halloween Traditions. The top row shows carving of neep lanterns (turnip). Scotland did not have pumpkins then (they do now) so they used turnips instead. These lanterns were said to scare off evil spirits. The second row on the left are people dressed up for guising (or disguising) which is like today's trick or treat. Children (or adults) would dress up as evil spirits and had to tell stories or sing before getting a treat. The second row on the right shows hazel nut burning. A couple would throw hazel nuts into a fire, if they burned guietly the union would be a happy one. If the nuts hissed



and crackled, a turbulent future lay ahead. Other traditions were treacle scones hanging from a string so no hands were used, and apple dookin' similar to apple bobbin. Some children would use forks trying to spear the apple. (https://www.nts.org.uk/stories/6-scottish-halloween-traditions).
