#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

As usual I enjoyed reading the Clan MacInnes Archer Autumn edition. There are a couple of things I'd like to expand on which may interest you.

There were a couple of mentions of scotch eggs. While Scotch whisky is definitely related to Scotland, sadly scotch eggs are not a particularly Scottish invention. The term "scotch" comes from the scoring and cutting of the meat which covers the egg and also is related to the hopscotch game and scotching a rumour. It is likely that several cultures came up with the idea of padding out what they had by combining hard boiled eggs and chopped leftovers. There is an Indian dish called Nargis Kofta which is essentially the same thing.

Having said that, "The Cook and Housewife's Manual by Mistress Margaret Dodds" published in Edinburgh in 1826 does have a recipe for Scotch eggs, which has grated ham and anchovy in the outside mixture. So we know that they have been eaten in Scotland for at least two hundred years.

The other thing is to say that when I was young, we did, indeed, go out guising and carved our lanterns from neeps (turnips). We would have some dressing-up clothes, hardly a disguise as the neighbours knew exactly who was at the door, and we would sing a little song about "please to help the guisers" hoping to get a couple of pennies. Afterwards we would dook (bob) for apples in a basin of water, or try spearing them with a fork held in your teeth and dropped from a height. Scones covered in treacle hanging from a rope is another Halloween game we would play. They bounce off you as you try to bite them (no hands as you said) then they swing back and splat treacle on your face. All great fun for the onlookers. Halloween customs were exported to America and reimported as Trick or Treat. North of the border it is still often called guising, but in England trick or treat is the term used.
